"Academic dishonesty is the act of passing someone else's work as one's own" (Thomas, Raynor & McKinnon, 2014, p. 533).




Figure 2. Academic integrity (Tulane University, n.d.)

Why it is important?



Literature review



- "<u>Standardize</u> structure, process and culture of the <u>organization</u>" (Hanbidge et al., 2018, p.2);
- "Younger age, male gender, lower grade point average, low conscientiousness, poor organizational skills, participation in extracurricular activities" are <u>factors that foster</u> <u>dishonest behavior</u> (Fenster, 2016, p. 243);
- Online courses plagiarize **more** than face-to-face courses students (Ekanhitanond, 2014, pp. 151-152);
- 10 29% of university and 80% of middle school students (Stetter, 2013, p. 675);
- Engagement of students, multi-languages, multimedia, immediate feedback, and interactive games and these are the <u>main elements of promoting academic integrity</u> (Hanbidge et al.,2018, p. 3);
- <u>Mobile technologies</u> e.g. *Waterloo University* (Hanbidge et al., 2018, p. 10; McKenzie, 2018; Anohina-Naumeca et al., 2018; Stetter, 2013);
- Turnitin **to detect** plagiarism (Stetter, 2013, p.678)

Qualitative research

• Creswell (2014) "qualitative research is an inquiry approach useful for exploring a problem and developing a detailed understanding of a central phenomenon which can be a key concept, idea or process" (p. 30).


Purposeful confirming sample

• To select "people who can best help to understand the central phenomenon" (Creswell, 2014, p. 228)
